Service to Our Communities



On Saturday, September 29, 2018, the Brothers of PUL descended upon Tanger's Outlet Mall in Oxon Hill, Maryland to support Lauryns Law. Lauryns Law is dedicated in promoting the importance of mental health awareness, to create and provide Public Service Announcements to strengthen youth, parents, schools and communities. The Law is named for Lauryn Santiago, a 15-year-old Prince George's County teen, who took her own life. All certificated school personnel who have direct contact with students on a regular basis are to complete training, by December 1 of each



year. Specified knowledge and skills are required to understand and respond to youth suicide risk and identify specified resources to help students in crisis; prohibiting a person from bringing a specified action against a county

board except under specified circumstances. Former Georgetown Hoya center and former NBA New York Knicks center, Michael Sweetney, spoke on his personal challenges with suicide.

Children's Mental Health Matters!

The Maryland public education campaign talked about and stressed the following topics that we all should look out for with our youth:

- ADHD
- Anxiety Disorders
- Bullying
- Depression
- Eating Disorders
- Grief
- Substance Abuse
- Suicide
- Trauma

Psychosis

Also, depression occurs in our older family members. Depression is not a normal part of aging. It may be



overlooked because for some older adults who have depression and sadness are not their main symptoms. They may have other, less obvious



symptoms of depression or they may not be willing to talk about their feelings. Therefore, doctors may be less likely to recognize that their patient has depression.

The Brothers provided logistical support for the walk, by directing traffic, and tending to the mile markers.



On Saturday, December 1, 2018, Brothers of PUL supported Brother of Eta Zeta and the Deltas of Prince George's County at Bowie State College in support of World AIDs Day. The Brothers assisted in getting students tested and providing educational awareness.

The best way to fight HIV is to know your status. A simple test can determine if you are infected with the virus. HIV is a virus spread through certain body fluids that attacks the body's immune system, specifically the CD4 cells, often called T cells. Over time, HIV can destroy so many of these cells that the body can't fight off infections and diseases. These special cells help the immune system fight off infections. Untreated, HIV reduces the number of CD4 cells (T cells) in the body. This damage to the immune system makes it harder and harder for the body to fight off infections and some other diseases. Opportunistic infections or cancers take advantage of a very weak immune system and signal that the person has AIDS.

Education

The PUL Educational Activities Team hosted a scholarship luncheon in November for the students that received scholarship from the Alpha Phi Alpha Foundation.



Project Alpha

On April 6, 2019, Brothers descended upon the Cheltenham Youth Detention Facility in Cheltenham, Maryland. Cheltenham serves as a secure detention facility for male youth who are waiting to go to court or be placed in a treatment facility. Brother President Massey, and Brothers Bailey, Porter, Scruggs, Halliburton, and Ross, were led by Brother Michael Nelson in conducting PUL's Project Alpha Program. The topics presented included: "New Beginnings," "Conflict Resolution," and "Project Alpha." All of the presentations were highly informative and well received by the thirty-eight young men in attendance. The presentations put the onus on the young men to be personally accountable for their actions.



Service to Our Communities

The Brothers of PUL provided multiple Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Baskets during the 2018 holiday season. The Brothers partnered with the Alpha Kappa Alphas (IGO) to serve Thanksgiving Day dinners to families from the Hillcrest Heights community in Prince George's County





Brother Robert Dantzler – Grandma's Hand Me Downs




